November is National Novel Writing Month. For those of you who have never heard of it, it was organized 1999 as an internet challenge to encourage people of all ages to write 50,000 words of a novel or non-fiction work in 30 days beginning November 1. NaNoWriMo is a non-profit organization that has a number of programs to support and promote writing fluency and education, while also allowing for local, or even on the other side of the world, writers to connect. Local regions have "write-ins" that writers can attend if they wish.

I have been doing NaNoWriMo since 2009 and I can honestly say that this program had the biggest impact on my ability to write, forcing me to turn off my inner editor and allow me to free-write, thus allowing for far more creativity in both my fiction and non-fiction articles and other projects. The other by-product of this program also helped me be a better editor. For those who complete the 50,000 words in November, they have a long list of supporters who can help you take your "novel" to the next phase, including helping you get it published.

While this may all sound daunting, it couldn't be easier. It's a fun website and program that does everything to encourage you to write to your heart's content. They even have fun writing prompts, lots of encouraging words, reference links to help you and ways to get you un-stuck. There is even a word counter to help you stay on track. So, whether you are a young person, a senior, or someone in between new to writing or a professional, jump online to **www.NaNoWriMo.org** and check it out. In an effort to facilitate public access to School Board information, Alsea School has added Boardbooks as a user-friendly way to access board meeting information. To find this new tool, please go to http://alsea.k12.or.us/board/minutes-agendas/ and click on the "Boardbooks" tab. Here you can create an account which will take you to our public access school page, where you will find a calendar of past, current, and future school board meetings as well as meeting minutes, which will only be posted after approval by the board and superintendent. The date and time for all meetings-board, bond, regular, or special-are posted here. If you click on "agenda" on the right-hand side of a meeting, you can access all of the documents discussed at that meeting. Please note that all reports to the board by administrators, athletic programs, etc., can now be accessed on the new "Superintendent" tab on the school website under "Administrative Reports".

At the bottom of our school Boardbooks page there is a tab to sign up for email notifications of posts to our page, including meeting minutes. Links will also still be posted on the school website under the Board tab as well as on the new school Facebook when it is up and running. If you do not have internet access and would like a copy of the minutes, please stop by the school office or call the school at 541-487-4305.

Alsea Emergency Response Plan

It is that time again when the Benton County Natural Hazards and Mitigation Plan (NHMP) must be reviewed and revised. This happens every 4 or 5 years and once again Alsea residents have the opportunity to voice their concerns and offer suggestions regarding potential hazardous effects during Natural Hazard emergencies.

For the next year, the Benton County Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan's steering committee will be meeting monthly to develop an updated NHMP in order to address a list of potential hazards facing Benton County. Alsea, as an unincorporated community, will fall under this plan. The list of Natural Hazards includes: Earthquakes, Floods, Fires, Landslides, Winter Storms, Wind Storms, Droughts, Volcanoes and Pandemics.

These hazards will be ranked according to the frequency and the severity of their impact upon both cities and all rural communities in Benton County. Mitigation measures will be developed and set out in the plan to help lessen those impacts. Alsea being one of those communities will have the opportunity to have a voice in the planning and developmental phase of the new plan.

Having only been an Alsea resident for the last 12 years, I have experienced several Natural Hazards or Incidents. I am sure there were many more before my time. Just recently during the summer of 2020, the fire along highway 34 with winds gusting to 60 mph was a scare for some, but fortunately the Alsea Rural Fire Department arrived on the scene near midnight and extinguished that fire before it got out of control. As I personally drove to the coast, leading a convoy of at least seven other cars, we had to stop four separate times to cut up large trees, which had been blown down across the highway in the strong winds. One was at least 3 feet in diameter. We also came upon 3 fires alongside the road.

The Alsea River has had numerous floods. The last flood closed down Deadwood Highway to all but the largest trucks. These floods threaten to overflow not only the Alsea River, but several homes and the sewage system for Alsea Water District. Raw sewage could have potentially flowed into the Alsea River as well as the Alsea School. Former high water flood marks can still be seen in the lowest levels of the school's building.

I recall that winter Ice storm which stranded travelers who were then put up overnight in neighbor's homes and were also fed and housed at the Alsea School. That storm also injured a member of Alsea's Fire Department who went on that call. It is hard to mitigate for that type of occurrence but plans had to be made for such an event.

There have been numerous power outages caused by winter storms. One mitigation measure was the awarding of a Home Land Securities grant which gave Alsea a generator to operate both the sewage system and keep water in the tanks for "down town" Alsea. Alsea's raw sewage now won't run off into the Alsea River and the fire hydrants will continue to have water should power be out for an extended time.

Landslides are a continual hazard along highway 34. The last big one took out a power pole and closed Highway 34. Fortunately, Alsea Quarry with the help of the Alsea Fire Department showed up with their equipment and cleared that section of the road, helping CPI to restore power. And how about the 2 plus years of Covid-19? As controversial as it may have been, there is no doubt the severity of its impact was enormous. Pandemics and Epidemics are listed as Hazards with this plan.

Many grants have been awarded to the Alsea Community Effort, The Alsea Emergency Preparedness Council, several churches and the Alsea Gleaners, so indeed much has been accomplished. But there is still work to be done. One way to help is to join in, think about volunteering with the Alsea Emergency Preparedness Council. Maybe take a look at the Alsea Rural Fire Department. Perhaps attend a meeting of the Alsea Community Effort. At the very least put together your own emergency plan. There are resources to do just this at the Alsea Library.

With regard to the new Benton County Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan, your input as a community member will be sought. You will have an opportunity to voice your concerns, offer suggestions and have some say in the development of this plan. There will be a suggestion box labeled "Benton County NHMP" placed in the Alsea Library. Drop on by the Library and drop a note. Harvest Time

It is harvest time in our orchard. The problem is there are hardly any fruit to harvest. Apple trees are almost empty. There are a few Bramleys, no Winesaps, a couple of Northern Spvs and three or four Liberties. What has happened? It was an unusual Spring. Yellowfaced bumblebees were out already in February when it was 65°F on the 18th. The month was dry with only a bit over 3" of rain until the 28th when there was a proper rain storm of nearly 3". In March and early April, fruit trees other than apples were flowering and various bees were busy. Then along came April with frost and rain and then more rain: 12.4" in April, 9.5" in May and 4" in June. Frost and a cool, wet Spring might be the explanation for poor harvest this year or the early warm period in February and March that woke-up bees followed by cool, wet weather led to poor pollination, or a combination of these two. It hasn't been just our orchard because a couple of volunteer apple trees along our driveway also have few apples. I hope next year will be better but we still have La Niña conditions off the coast and the climate it is a changin'.


