

Musings from the ACE President

A fresh new year and there is much going on in the community (even besides the swirling weather). I'd like to bring the reader's attention to two happenings in this issue.


First, graduate students in the Department of Forestry Ecosystems and Society at Oregon State University completed their final report for Alsea Community Effort and our timber parcel off Little Lobster Creek Road. The class that these students participated in is called Interdisciplinary Approaches to Socio-Ecological Problems and is taught by faculty members Reem Hajjar and Jacob Bukoski. The report is nicely written and formatted and includes information about our community forest and ideas for what ACE might do in the future with the parcel. We have now posted the final report on the ACE website so you can read the recommendations for the property that was compiled by students: https://www.alseacommunityeffort.org/ace-lobster-valleyproject. You can also read a hard copy of the 60-page document at the Alsea Community Library. We are grateful for the recommendations made by the students and have begun having Board discussions about next steps.

The second ACE happening is that our ACE Art Committee in partnership with the Friends of the Corvallis-Benton County Library are in the midst of a project to commission a new piece of art for the Alsea Community Library. The Friends group provided partial funding for the project. Alsea Resident Kathy Plaza helped the committee envision and plan for the project to ask area artists to design an art piece that will greet patrons as they enter the library, and which embodies the spirit of the Alsea Valley. The Art Committee will be accepting designs for the project through January 31st. Once the ideas are gathered, the Art Committee, Alsea Library staff, and the ACE Board will choose a winning design. The artist, or group of artists will then have until the end of May to create and install the permanent exhibit. Town Meeting Update




Alsea Kitchen Club update

Reviving the Alsea Citizens Advisory Committee


In 1970, the State of Oregon created the Land Conservation and Development Commission (LCDC) for the purpose of preserving farm and forest land and for planning the use of all the rural land in the state held in private ownership. The intention of the LCDC was for people who live or own land in rural areas to be involved in writing the comprehensive plan for land use in their own counties. At that time, the Benton County Planning Department held meetings and elections in various areas of the county and created the Citizens Advisory Committees for various geographical locations in (CACs).

Over the years, the Alsea CAC has held many meetings and attended planning commission hearings usually in support of Alsea Citizens. These activities were instrumental in getting approval for the Alsea Clinic, the Alsea Assisted Living Home, the Alsea Christian Fellowship Church, the Alsea Library, and use of some farmland for Alsea School's former baseball team.


Benton County is currently planning to update their Comprehensive Plan. In response to this project and to concerns heard from our town, the Benton County Community Development Department (formerly the Planning Department and the Building Department) has requested that we reactivate the Alsea CAC. To do this we need to elect three new committee members. It looks like Monday evenings will be the best time for meetings. We are hoping that part of the meetings can be done over zoom. All the meetings will be open to the public to present their ideas. At this point we are waiting for the county to name the date for us to hold elections.







ACAC Update



January 16, 2024

What a winter wonderland we have had the past few days! (irony intended) I will keep this update brief as I am trying to get this off to Kathy Adair while my power is on again. 'Cause who knows when it will be off, or on, again! Following is a brief update on current projects of Alsea Community Action Collaborative (ACAC). If you would like further information on any of these topics or need other assistance from ACAC, please contact Sara Cash at acac97324@gmail.com or call/text 541-602-7819, or Naomi Shadwick at shadwick@casco.net . We continue to focus our limited resources on our stated purpose to create a community where our kids can build bright futures through community-based projects that enhance safety, stability, and sustainability.

Clinic closure: For more information from the community conversations in December about the clinic closure, look for another article on that topic in this issue. As a result of those conversations, ACAC has facilitated the creation of a workgroup around the topic of reopening the Alsea Health Clinic. There has been one meeting with the Community Health Centers of Benton and Linn Counties (BHC). The crux of the issue seems to be that due to their legal structure, Benton Health Centers cannot provide the type of medical care and attention that Alsea residents used to receive when the clinic was locally managed. This obstacle is compounded by the fact the BHC is hugely overbudget for the fiscal year. The workgroup plans to meet again to explore how the county might be able to provide reduced services at the clinic while the option of reopening the clinic with local management or as a satellite of a nearby rural health clinic is explored. ACAC through the sponsorship of Alsea Community Effort is seeking grant funding for an economic feasibility study on reopening the clinic. Keep your eyes and ears out for more information to come on this important project.

Alsea Citizens Advisory Committee: ACAC has been working closely with Alsea Citizens Advisory Committee Chairman Mimi Stout and the director of Benton County's Community Development Department, Darren Nichols, to reconvene this committee to serve as a vital voice for Alsea at the county level. Benton County plans to rewrite the county wide 30-year planning documents, which will allow Alsea to petition concerning land use issues.

This committee is meant to advocate for the vision that the Alsea community has for our shared future. Look for upcoming meeting announcements, which will include an **election of at least three new committee members**. Alsea Facebook, Alsea Valley Voice if possible, and a possible flyer will give dates for that meeting and details of how the election will be managed. An initial meeting to relaunch the committee at the Alsea Library on December 8th was well attended, showing that people have lots of ideas and interest in land use issues in Alsea. Darren Nichols and Toby Lewis, Floodplain Administrator/Senior Planner, were in attendance from Benton County Community Development.

Government Corner: Sadly, the Government Corner planned for January 17th was cancelled due to inclement weather and road conditions. This meeting will be rescheduled for February or March. Again, look to local communication outlets for details on the upcoming meeting.

Alsea Health Clinic Survey: Many thanks to those of you who responded to the Alsea Health Clinic Survey. This was meant to be an informal survey to see if the community wants ACAC to focus our limited energy, attention, and resources to advocate for the reopening of the clinic. I want to personally thank all of you who took the time to respond, especially for the handwritten notes of encouragement and wisdom. Huge thanks also to Emily Blake for overseeing the IT end of this project. The responses to the survey were overwhelmingly in support of reopening the clinic with the ability to be able to "walk in "for minor health services without having to be a registered patient at the clinic.

A message from Benton County Community Development about flood plain mapping:

As discussed at the December 8th Alsea Citizen's Advisory Committee meeting, the flood hazard mapping in the Alsea watershed needs updating and several agencies – Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), Department of Land Conservation and Development, US Army Corps of Engineers, Department of Geology and Mineral Industries, and Oregon Emergency Management – are aware of this.

Flood Hazard Remapping Project Information

FEMA is currently leading a project to update the flood hazard mapping for most of Benton County, including the Alsea area. Some key things to know about the project are:

- · It's a large project that also includes neighboring counties.
- Because of its size, this project is expected to take 8-10 years from start to finish.
- · We are about 2 years into the project.
- The landscape and development have changed quite a bit in some places since the original studies were done in the mid- to late 1970's which means some areas will be removed from the flood hazard zones and some areas will be newly shown as high flood risk.
- FEMA, as well as their consultants and partner agencies, are committed to ensuring that the revised maps are based on current data and are as accurate as they can reasonably be.
- If you have historical knowledge and/or photographs of past flood events, please send that information to me so that I can make sure FEMA has access to it; this kind of information is helpful for checking the accuracy of the models.



New CTE Building to Begin Construction Soon!

We are very excited to share that the new Alsea School CTE building will begin construction soon! You may recall from our last notice that the District had pre-qualified three good construction firms for this project. In early January we received bids from all three companies and Todd Construction provided the low bid and is now under contract. Their bid is within the current budget and they expect to complete the building this fall.

The construction plans are still in review with the County, and we anticipate receiving approval for permits this month. Final coordination of the construction details is proceeding and we expect to see Todd mobilize early this spring.

Because of the nature of the building, there will be times when a lot of equipment and materials will be coming into town and being placed on the east side of the playground. We expect to send out notices on days when there will be increased traffic and/or lots of noise.

Our community has been very patient with this long process and we appreciate your continued support as construction begins.

Health Navigator at Alsea Library Weekly (mostly)


Oscar Monroy, Health Navigator, is at Alsea Library most Thursdays from 1:00pm to 5:00pm. Although you can just drop by to talk with him, it is a good idea to call the library to see if he will be there. If you need a specific time slot, contact 541-766-2130 to make an appointment to meet with him or another Health Navigator. Health Navigation is available in person at the library on Thursday afternoons or by phone other times during the week. The Alsea Library has cards with contact information for Oscar and the Health Navigation team across the CHC system.

Oscar can help with accessing many other services besides arranging CHC appointments. If would like to become an established patient at any CHC location, bring your insurance card to expedite the registration process. He can also help people complete applications for the Oregon Health Plan (Medicaid), Social Security Disability, Medicare, food programs, and utility assistance. He can also help access programs for installing a ramp or other assistive devices to make a home safer and more accessible for the elderly and/or disabled.

Prescriptions: If you are not signed up for alternative delivery for your CHC based prescriptions to come to your house, Oscar can bring them out to the Alsea Library for you to pick up on Thursday afternoons. Please contact Oscar at 541-766-2130 or in person at the library, so this information can be communicated to the BHC pharmacy in Corvallis.

Transportation: Oscar and other Health Navigators can help CHC patients arrange for transportation to and from health care appointments outside Alsea. Another option for transportation is through volunteer faith-based organizations like Volunteer Caregivers of Albany. Yes, they will come out to Alsea and pick people up and bring them home! To schedule a ride, you need to have the time, duration of visit, and address for your appointment.
